Aim of the course	analysis of contemporary art issues on the base of systematic knowledge of movements. Special emphasis is put on Polish art (including Wrocław examples)
Prerequisites	general orientation in art history
Learning outcomes:	
– knowledge	student has an extended knowledge of contemporary art movements , is conscious of general valuation of art, can make reasonable reviews of particular exhibitions
– skills	student is able to analyse art works and can express his/her own valuation of art issues. Applying her/his knowledge, student can write interesting essays on contemporary art.
– personal and social competence	student can use his/her judgements to provide adequate art promotions. As being responsible from social point of view when working with others, he/she can organize particular art events
Course content	Basic analysis of contemporary art according to general tendencies: 1) gestural and geometrical abstraction 2) realistic researches and figuration 3) pop art and similar tendencies (including graffiti and street art) 4) experiments with technology and media, video art, net art etc. 5) relational and critical art
