| – knowledge | student has an extended knowledge of contemporary art movements , is conscious of general valuation of art, can make reasonable reviews of particular exhibitions |
| – skills | student is able to analyse art works and can express his/her own valuation of art issues. Applying her/his knowledge, student can write interesting essays on contemporary art. |
| – personal and social competence | student can use his/her judgements to provide adequate art promotions. As being responsible from social point of view when working with others, he/she can organize particular art events |
| Course content | Basic analysis of contemporary art according to general tendencies: 1) gestural abstraction 2) geometric abstraction 2) pop art, graffiti, street art etc. 3) technology and media - additional visits and discussions at galleries and museums |
