Aim of the course	The students: - gain theoretical and practical knowledge of mineral painting techniques used in different periods (historic and contemporary practices), - are introduced to the use of mineral materials, modified mineral materials and other innovative painting techniques, - gain knowledge of the techniques that can be used to create desired effects and develop a creative and innovative approach to the selection of materials, - develop their artistic personalities, ideas and styles of work in order to arrive at their own original painting techniques
Prerequisites	Successful completion of Painting Techniques courses held in the first and second semester
Learning outcomes:	
– knowledge	The student: - has extended knowledge of the fundamentals of mineral painting techniques: e.g. calcium, trass, mineral plaster, sgraffito, secco (dry), fresco (murals), silicate (Keim paint), mineral paint, current facade paints, enamel paint (a metal substrate) and stained glass, - has knowledge of historical and contemporary drawing equipment.
— skills	The student: - designs and checks the theoretical assumptions of implementing sgraffito, fresco, sylicate painting, mixed techniques, - creates their own techniques, - creates compositions using drawing techniques, - utilises the skills acquired during the work on the projects undertaken in the course workshops, - is encouraged to develop an individual style enabling innovativeness.
– personal and social competence	The student: - expresses their thoughts and reflections through their work, - creates an artistic statement, forming their own original artistic attitudes, - works on projects individually or in a team.
Course content	Creating and implementing projects using selected techniques based on knowledge and skills gained through the course Performing research and experimenting
Course form and number of course hours	The classes are held in a studio, lab and lecture room. The course is delivered through lectures, seminars, tutorials, and practical work. - 3 hours per week in the 2nd year - 4 hours per week in the 4th year - 4 hours per week in the 5th year



Assessment methods and criteria	A full implementation of a practical work program (100%) and active participation in classes (50%) are necessary to complete the course. The final grade is a combination of the following: Written or oral examinations (50%) The quality of coursework (40%) Engagement in the course (10%)
Assessment type	3rd semester – graded pass (examination review and a test of knowledge) 4th semester – examination review and oral or written examination of knowledge (with a grade)
